For the socially responsible artwork, I'd like to highlight Guernica (1937) by Pablo Picasso. This large-scale painting was created in response to the bombing of the Spanish town of Guernica during the Spanish Civil War. Picasso's use of stark black, white, and gray tones, along with distorted, anguished figures, conveys the horrors of war and human suffering. Guernica is a powerful anti-war statement and serves as a reminder of the devastating impact of violence on innocent civilians. The painting has since become a universal symbol of protest against war and injustice, demonstrating Picasso's social responsibility as an artist.

The top half of the collage represents decay and contamination, using burned paper, black smudges, and dried leaves to symbolize the environmental damage caused by human neglect. The diagonal flow from dark to light shows the tension between destruction and hope. Through this piece, I aimed to communicate the urgent need to protect our planet.
